From now on and until further notice, your Care Professionals will be wearing face masks in most situations during your visits. I understand that for some, this may initially seem alarming but I can assure you that you will receive the same warm and friendly care and support as usual.

It also takes a bit of getting used to for our team. This is purely a safety measure to keep you and our team as safe as possible from the transmission of COVID19.

COVID-19 UPDATE

Here's a quick guide to let you know when your Bluebird Care Professional will be wearing Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and the type of PPE they will be wearing during your visits.

Your circumstances

Your Care Assistant needs to be in direct contact with you to provide the care and support you need. This means they have to touch you to support you.

You or someone in the household is coughing.

You are repeatedly sneezing, coughing or vomiting.

Your Care Assistant does not need to physically touch you to support you but they do need to be closer than 2 meters away from you to provide the support you need. e.g. support with medication, preparing food that you can eat yourself, some cleaning tasks.

You or someone in your home is in the extremely vulnerable category (You will have received a letter from your GP)

Your Care Assistant does not need to be in direct contact with you. No one in your home is coughing and we can maintain 2m distance PPE your Care




Keeping our spirits up during lockdown

We were delighted to launch our new pen pal project last month, which is an initiative aimed at connecting children with people from different generations in a positive way. This will hopefully help to keep people's spirits up whilst physical contact with people is limited.

You may have already received a letter from a child in the post or had one passed on by our Care Professionals. There is no pressure to write back to any children who write to you, but if you would like to, you can send your reply letter into us at the Bluebird Care office and we will post your letter on to the children.

The children are the children of our team members and don't worry, your address or any other personal details have not been shared with the children. They wrote initial letters and we have sent them on to our customers who we know enjoy the company of children. They often like to include a drawing or painting with it too.

If you haven't received a letter and would like to join this scheme, we can match you up with a child to begin your postal friendship. It will also give the children a great opportunity to learn more about people from different generations. As they are all being home-schooled at the moment, it would be a welcome activity for many children to get involved in.

Things you can do to help keep yourself and others stay safe from COVID19

- Maintain 2 meters distance from people who do not live in your home wherever possible.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, or use alcohol sanitiser that contains at least 60% alcohol if hand washing facilities are not available this is particularly important after taking public transport.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in a bin.
- Wash your hand towels on a hot wash regularly. If you would like your Care Assistants to do this for you, please call us at the office and we can ensure that this is noted on your care plan.
- Keep a supply of kitchen roll in your home for hand drying. This is more hygienic than using reusable hand towels.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.
- If you are worried about your symptoms or those of a family member or colleague, please call NHS 111. People should not go to their GP or other healthcare environment.

Keep in touch with your family and friends with our help

Keeping in touch with family, friends and other loved ones makes us feel connected and helps with feelings of loneliness. Whilst the measures the Government has currently put in place, help stop the spread of coronavirus, keeping in touch with people has become more difficult to do, technology can help and we can help you with this. Here's some guidance on how to video call depending on the type of device you have. If you need help to get it set up, just contact us at the office and we will make sure that someone from our team can help you get started.



What is video calling?

Video calling can be a nicer way of chatting with others than just a phone call, because it lets you see the person you're taking to, and them see you. You can even have a group chat with multiple people.

Not sure how to get started? Here we give you some step-by-step instructions on how to keep in touch using a video call using different devices

Video calling on <u>Apple</u> phone or device (iPhone, iPad, Mac)

Remember: make sure you are connected to a wireless internet network (WiFi) before doing a video call. Video calling uses a lot of data and could result in additional charges from your mobile phone network if you are not connected to WiFi.



If you and the person you want to call both have an iPhone, iPad or Mac, you can use FaceTime to video call each other.

It will already be installed on your phone or device, so you don't have to do anything. Follow these instructions to start a FaceTime chat.

FaceTime on an iPhone or iPad

- Go to Contacts and select the person you want to call.
- There will be an option to use FaceTime.
- Click the symbol that looks like a camera to start video calling.
- To end the call, just click the red phone icon.

FaceTime on a Mac

- Open FaceTime using the FaceTime icon.
- There is a search box.
- Type in the name of the person you want to call, click enter.
- If the person you are trying to call has the right device, you will see the option to make a video call. Click this to start video calling.
- To end the call, just click the red phone icon.

If the person you want to call does not have an Apple phone or device, you can still have a video call with them by using other apps like WhatsApp or Facebook Messenger. You can download one of these from the App Store.

Video call using an Android phone

Remember: make sure you are connected to a wireless internet network (WiFi) before doing a video call. Video calling uses a lot of data and could result in additional charges from your mobile phone network if you are not connected to WiFi.



There are lots of different types of Android phones, including ones made by Samsung, Google, Sony and LG. Ask someone if you're not sure if your phone is an Android phone. You can use many different applications on your phone to make video calls. We'll look at some of the most common here. You can download any of these apps for free by finding them in the Play Store.

WhatsApp (same method if you have an apple iphone)

- Open WhatsApp on your phone.
- Click the Calls tab.
- Press the icon showing a phone with a plus symbol next to it.
- Click the magnifying glass icon and type the name of the person you want to call.
- Click the symbol that looks like a camera next to their name to start video calling.



- You can add up to four other people into a video call to turn it into a group chat.
- During the video call, just click the add participant icon and search for their name to add them.
- To end the call, just click the red phone icon.

Facebook Messenger (same method if you have an apple iphone)



- Open Facebook Messenger on your phone.
- Click the Chats tab.
- Click the pencil icon and type the name of the person you want to
- Click the symbol that looks like a camera next to their name to start video calling.
- You can add up to six other people into a video call to turn it into a group chat.
- During the video call, just click the '+' symbol and search for their name to add them.
- To end the call, just click the red phone icon.

Video calling using a computer

Zoom or Skype are examples of video calling software you could use.

You don't need to install anything to use these, it can all be done through your internet browser. The person who you want to speak to just needs to make sure they have an account as well. They can then send you a link to join a video chat.

Remember: Only click links from people you know and trust. It's always worth double checking with them that they have sent you a link.

Receiving a video call on Zoom

- Click on the link your contact has sent you.
- Click 'join from your browser' to join the video call.
- To end the call, click the red phone icon or close the browser window.

Making a video call on Zoom

- Open Zoom on your computer.
- Click 'new meeting'.
- Click 'invite' at the bottom of the screen.
- Click 'copy URL'. This will give you a link that you can share with family and friends.
- Just copy it and send it to them in an email.
- To end the call, click the red phone icon.

Receiving a video call on Skype

- Click on the link your contact has sent you.
- A window will open. Click 'join as guest'.
- Type in your name and click 'join' to join the video call.
- To end the call, click the red phone icon or close the browser window.

If you would like to set up the video calls yourself, you will need to download Zoom or Skype to your computer. You can do this for free via Zoom's website or Skype's website. You then just need to sign up for a free account with them using an email address.

Making a video call on Skype

- Open Skype on your computer.
- Click 'meet now'.
- Click 'start call'.
- When the call has started, click 'share call link'. This will give you a link that you can share with family and friends. Just copy it and send it to them in an email.
- To end the call, click the red phone icon.



If you are using a desktop that does not have a built in camera and microphone you may have to purchase a headset.

Marking the 75th Anniversary of VE Day from home...

On Friday 8 May, we'll be paying tribute to the service and sacrifice of the entire Second World War generation, from British, Commonwealth and Allied Forces to evacuees and those who served on the home front. As we face some of the most challenging times since the end of the Second World War,



now more than ever it is important to unite in recognition of service to the nation, just as communities did 75 years ago.

With members of the public unable to attend VE Day 75 events, there are a number of televised and remote activities on Friday to help us all pay tribute.

Here are some of the remote activities happening on the day.....

A UK-wide singalong to Vera Lynn's 'We'll Meet Again at 9pm. You can watch and join in on BBC One who will be featuring the singalong as part of their VE Day broadcast.

At 11am on Friday 8 May, BBC One will lead a poignant two-minute silence to mark the 75th anniversary of the end of the Second World War. This national moment of remembrance will pay tribute to heroes of the past and present.

As we face some of the most challenging times since the end of the Second World War, now more than ever it is important to come together and unite.

VE Day75: The Announcement Of Victory

At 2.45pm BBC One will broadcast Sir Winston Churchill's famous victory speech in which he addressed the nation to announce the end of the war in Europe, which he made from 10 Downing Street on 8 May 1945.

At the heart of the broadcast will be a specially created film to celebrate and remember Sir Winston Churchill's famous radio address that he made to the nation at 3pm on VE Day. This will be a poignant and emotional piece, reminding both those who were there and subsequent generations of this monumental day in our history.
